When Do You Remember?

A while back during a discussion on sprinklers in schools I had a building code official ask me when was the last time I remembered a modern school burning. Six months later a fairly modern school burned in Guilford County. It was a total loss.

I suspect policy makers in that county have a different concept of sprinklers in school now. I always hoped that individual remembered the conversation as well as I did.

Traditionally, our nature is to be reactive. It is also our nature to focus on the spectacular. While select individuals may espouse warnings about pending disaster potential, most people aren't really concerned till one occurs. Unfortunately, tragedy can come in small increments or significant events with large life loss, but people tend to react more quickly to the larger event. Injury prevention experts have taken advantage in many cases of disaster by using them as a catapult to get safety regulation passed. The only problem is that once the shock of the disaster wears off, people forget the argument. A good example is the fire and life loss that occurred in Rhode Island at the Station nightclub fire February 20, 2003. Many of us remember appearing before several legislative study committees asking how we could make sure this didn't happen in North Carolina. I was impressed with the statement of *Ms. Renee Walton* made in the report of the fire to the Rhode Island General Assembly called *Making Rhode Island the Safest State*. She was interviewed and her quote was included in the section of family members and survivors:

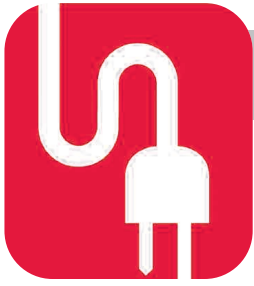
"And I'm sure if you ask one of the owners of the club now if they could go back three months and three days, would they have sprinklers in their building, I'm sure they would say yes."

It is our responsibility as code officials to pass and enforce codes designed to keep citizens safe while in buildings. If we don't remain vigilant of these issues we are doomed to repeat that which occurred before.

Occupancy and egress for example have been affected by public assembly fires on numerous occasions, yet if you look around you can find numerous examples of blocked exits today. I recently read a book titled *The Tinder Box: The Iroquois Theater Fire 1903*, by Anthony P. Hatch. It involved Chicago's most deadly single fire that occurred less than a month after the opening of the new *reportedly fireproof Iroquois Theater*. It was an evening of standing room only for a holiday musical "Mr. Blue Beard, Jr." Of the 1,900 people in the au-

dience, many who were women and children, 603 died. Oddly enough, among the 500 performers and backstage personnel, only one was killed who was the tightrope artist high above the stage. Due to a long history of theater fires in the U.S. and Europe, fire precautions that were well developed at the time were not followed by the management. They thought it was fireproof. One primary violation came from the stage scenery consisting of canvas backdrops painted with highly flammable oil paints. These were placed close to a large number of hot lights. Adequate exits existed but were blocked or locked and trained ushers could have prevented many deaths from the panic. They just weren't used. At 3:15 p.m. a hot light started a fire on a velvet curtain. The on-duty fireman was equipped with two tubes of patent powder called Kilfyres. When an attempt was made, sprinkling these on the fire proved totally useless. The asbestos fire curtain which was supposed to come down and separate the audience snagged before it reached the full down position. The curtain was apparently instantly consumed in the fire. The inexperienced stage crew was slow to pull down the asbestos curtain, and as at least one survivor testified, may have pulled down a scenery curtain, instead of the fire curtain. As the fire started the orchestra continued to play on, and the leading actor urged people to remain calm and seated. Although this no doubt prevented some deaths from those who did panic and rush out, those who heeded his advice perished in the rapidly developing fire. A number of victims were found still seated. The theater management had added iron gates over many of the exit doors to prevent people from gaining access without paying, so some of the gates were locked, others were unlocked but opening them required operation of a small latch which was unfamiliar to most patrons. Other doors opened inwards. Many people were trapped behind these unopened doors. The time it took to open the other doors added panic as it forced almost everyone to funnel together to use the main exits. Trampled bodies were piled several high in the stairwell area where exits from the balcony met the exit from the main floor. More fatalities occurred when fire broke out underneath an alley fire escape. People above the fire jumped.

All injuries occurred within 15 minutes of the start of the fire, which was reportedly under control by the fire department within half an hour. It wasn't an issue of poor response, or delayed alarm by the fire department. It was an issue of complacency by Chicago's building officials and the owners. With advances in building construction and regulation, we tend to forget that life safety in structures involves not only designing and construction of a safe building, but operating it in the same manner. It also involves looking at the past and potential for the future.

Perhaps the following statement would serve the purpose: The department or the inspector, neither has nor accepts any responsibility for the industrial machinery or it's affects on the electrical system. I believe we need to communicate the underlined portion so that those who do not to understand the science of electricity will know that improperly imposing the exempted equipment on a correctly designed, installed and inspected system may invalidate the approved criteria of the electrical system.

Things have changed, always will, and we must find a way to continue to help others understand the impact on them. Our largest tool is education. If we can get all those involved in the daily applications and use of electricity to understand its awesome power, and how it is safely handled we will have succeeded. Members we need all of you to make this a part of your daily responsibility, prepare yourself and be able to answer why, and not with just the code, statute, or standard says so.

On this page, you will see the statement: "Anyone who knows about a workplace safety or health hazard may file a complaint, and OSHNC will investigate the concerns reported". You can file a complaint online.

2). On the left-hand side of the page, are the phone numbers for the Eastern and Western Bureau Chiefs. Tim Childers is the Western Bureau Chief, his number is 336-776-4420. Accidents / Incidents

Fire in Gastonia Parkdale Mills. A flash fire at a Parkdale Mills plant in Gastonia sent three employees to the hospital. The workers were doing routine maintenance on an electrical panel when a fire began around 11:45 a.m., said Jim Landis, Gastonia Fire Department spokesman. The employees suffered burns, but their injuries are not life-threatening, a Gaston Emergency Medical Services dispatcher said. The employees were transported to Gaston Memorial Hospital.

We fear now that since Senate Bill 490 has passed **Fire, Explosions will likely increase.** We will continue to track and report these incidents. In the meantime, those in the safety community will keep trying to educate the public and business owners. It will be noted in every newsletter issue when these incidents could be a result of this legislation and all those who helped make it law.

Product Safety

Control Panels. Many equipment systems have a main control

panel as the heart of their electrical system. A great deal of these control panels are only connected to the equipment by a few cables or a single conduit. Some are not even physically mounted on or near the equipment and machinery being controlled. Since these control panels have no moving parts, and do not produce anything expect organized energy and instructions, we hope they will not be considered machinery or part of the machine. Every day, testing lab inspectors find serious deficiencies with these control panels, including: Misuse of certified components, incorrect or missing short circuit and overload protection, easy access for shock and electrocution, unknown / untested components, incorrectly sized motor overloads, incorrect electrical ratings, ordinary location panels in a hazardous location application, just to name a few. There are many options for manufacturers of these panels to get them Listed – almost all the test labs have a program for this. Without proper training and continued follow-up, these panels represent known hazards and a liability to the owner and anyone else who performs work associated with them. Recently, there have been control panels coming in from China.

Chinese Extension Cords have been reported for sale, with counterfeit manufacturer logos on them, and counterfeit testing laboratory marks. Some of these extension cords contain toxic and radioactive metals in the conductors, and toxic plastic in the conductor jacketing and cables. If you see any of these extension cords (Or any other certified product that looks suspicious), please report them to the testing lab whose mark is being claimed on the product. Try to get a sample of the suspicious product.

Legislative Actions

Senate Bill 490 and What It Means to the Inspectors

What started out as an effort by those concerned with economic development and many others to eliminate the requirement for Third Party Testing of Industrial Equipment was carried to the extreme. Our NC Legislators took the lead for the Economic Development Community on writing the bill. Somewhere during the course of development the bill was changed to exempt Industrial Machinery from all building codes.

The underlined paragraph below is a copy of the changed text of GS 143-138 (b).

Nothing in this Article shall extend to or be construed as being applicable to the regulation of the design, construction, location, installation, or operation of industrial machinery. However, if during the building code inspection process, an electrical inspector has any concerns about the electrical safety of a piece of industrial machinery, the electrical inspector may refer that concern to the Occupational Safety and Health Division in the North Carolina Department of Labor but shall not withhold the certificate of occupancy nor mandate third-party testing of the industrial machinery based solely on this concern. For the purposes of this paragraph, 'industrial machinery' means equipment and machinery used in a system of operations for the explicit purpose of producing a product. The term does not include equipment that is permanently attached to or a component part of a building and related to general building services such as ventilation, heating and cooling, plumbing, fire suppression or prevention, and general electrical transmission.

Let's break it down to simple language based on an Inspector's perspective. The first sentence takes away the code officials ability to ensure the safety of the general public and employees.

- **Design:** This allows for the equipment to disregard applicable standards of the United States and could result in misapplication of safety standards in that foreign standards often are not effective or compatible with our electrical systems.
- **Construction:** This applies to the construction of the industrial

machine meaning the material used in construction of the machine, lead paint, asbestos, or other toxic items used in the manufacturing of the equipment.

- **Location:** The code official has no right to question the location of the equipment. It may be installed to block exits for the worker or be located in classified areas when the equipment is not rated for the environment. It also may be located in front of other building components.
- **Installation:** The code official has no right to question the weight of the equipment to verify that the building components will support the equipment.
- **Operation:** The code official can not ask what the current draw or fault current contribution of the industrial machine is. How do you ensure service size, feeder size, or bracing is correct? If the owner does not want to install a safety disconnect at the industrial machine they do not have to (think of all the money they can save here). If the owner chooses to install oversize overcurrent protection they can do so. If they do not want to ground the equipment because that cost too much money they do not have to.

Definition of Industrial Machinery

As Defined in the statute: For the purposes of this paragraph, 'industrial machinery' means equipment and machinery used in a system of operations for the explicit purpose of producing a product.

Don't be led astray by this definition. This does not mean cooking, baking, polishing, spraying, or packing a product unless it is part of a system of operations for producing a product. As you can see the interpretation of the bill's language will likely cause multiple challenges.

Most authorities will probably need a set of guidelines and/or many rulings from their attorney on when a piece of equipment or system of operations is exempted from evaluation by the code enforcement official. We recommend that inspectors keep explicit notes on file when these challenges come into play. The simplest policy would be to not have this equipment on site until the final or CO has been issued. If this is not possible it seems to be advisable that those involved with the project be given notice that the inspection does not cover the industrial machinery or it's affects on the electrical, mechanical, fire, plumbing and building components and systems.

Lastly we note that per the bill only the electrical inspector may refer concerns to the NCDOL/OSHA. Most authorities will need to have this addressed by an attorney for policy enactment and liability issues, so that the departments and the inspectors are performing their duties in a way that no liability is incurred.

Please advise us of your policies or concerns as they arise. Our association will continue to keep you all informed as developments occur relating to these changes.

Another issue dealing with the Building Code is Senate Bill 640 which deals with industrial equipment. This bill was signed and made law on August 31, 2007. In a nut shell the law is that any industrial equipment that produces or manufactures a product is exempt from the building code. This includes point loads and any other technical requirements.

2007 Fall Mechanical Workshops

Two workshops are scheduled for the fall of this year at to provide additional opportunities for inspectors to attend a workshop. Each workshop is a one day workshop that provides six hours of continuing education credit for mechanical inspectors. 2008 NC Mechanical Inspectors Association Annual Meeting

The conference is scheduled for August 24 – 27, 2008 at the Sheraton at Atlantic Beach, NC. Additional information will be reported as plans are completed. Mark the dates on your calendar and plan to attend!

The New 2006 NC Building Code Is Based on the 2003 International Building Code

The new 2006 NC Building Code is modeled from the 2003 International Building Code and became effective July 1, 2006. The new NC Building Code Volumes for Mechanical, Gas, and Energy are based on the 2003 editions of the corresponding ICC codes with the inclusion of NC amendments. One very significant change approved by the NC Building Code Council was to eliminate the mechanical, gas, and plumbing sections from the 2006 NC One and Two Family Dwelling Code. The 2006 NC One and Two Family Dwelling Code references the 2006 NC Mechanical, Gas, and Plumbing Codes for requirements. This means that all plumbing, mechanical, and gas requirements **will be contained in one respective code book for each discipline**. Please make sure the contractors in your jurisdiction understand this important amendment.

Generally, the new 2006 Edition of the NC Building Code includes the amendments included in the 2003 International Code that were approved since the 2000 ICC codes were published, the NC specific amendments from the 2002 NC Building Code that the ad-hoc committees moved forward, and any separate amendments approved under the rules review procedures since the adoption of the 2002 NC Building Code. Also, an accompanying commentary is being prepared for each volume of the NC Building Code. The commentaries will be modeled from the 2003 ICC commentaries and will be revised to reflect NC amendments.

Please note that the effective date for the 2006 One- and Two-Family Dwelling Code is June 1, 2007 and that the NC BCC is allowing continued use of the 2002 One- and Two-Family Dwelling Code for permits obtained through the end of 2007.

Development of the 2009 NC Building Code

Ad hoc committees have been formed and work is well underway on the next edition of the NC Building Code. The 2009 NC Building Code is being modeled upon the 2006 ICC codes and will include NC amendments. The planned effective date is January 1, 2009.

Mechanical Code, Gas Code, and Energy Code Interpretations on the Web

The NC Department of Insurance has placed interpretations of the 2006 NC Building Codes on-line on the DOI web-site. These interpretations can be viewed, downloaded, and printed. Interpretations are included for the Mechanical, Gas, Energy, and Plumbing Codes as well as the other volumes of the NC Building Code. The interpretations are in order by code section number for easy reference.

Shower Lining Installation
 2006 Plumbing Code
 Section 417.5.2
 Date: July 1, 2006
 Revised May 17, 2007

Question: Are shower liners required to be sloped to the fixture drain?

Answer: no

The Building Code Council has amended section 417.5.2 to delete the requirement for sloping the liner 1/4" per foot, therefore the shower liner is not required to be slope by the plumbing code; but the shower liner shall be sloped if required by the manufacturer's installation instructions.

The next quarterly meeting is scheduled for October 23, 2007 at 1:00 PM. The agenda for each quarterly meeting can be found on our website at www.ncdoi.net.

Election of Officers

Hayden Lutterloh was re-elected as Chairman. Lutterloh is Assistant Fire Chief for the City of Sanford. Deborah Simpson was re-elected as Vice Chairman. Tim Bradley was re-elected as Secretary

Election of Committee Chairman

Richard Ducker was re-elected as Policies and Procedures Committee Chairman. William Rakatansky was re-elected as Education and Research Committee Chairman. Deborah Simpson was elected as Qualifications and Evaluation Committee Chairman.

Presentation of Fifth Standard Level III Certificates

Chairman Lutterloh presented the following individuals with their fifth Standard Level III Inspection Certificate: James Lee Buchanan of the Jackson County Inspection Department; John Boniface, III of the Manteo Inspection Department; and Michael Joseph Hamm of the Manufactured Building Division of the Department of Insurance

The number of individuals achieving this level of certification is currently 162.

Disciplinary Actions between April, 2007 through July, 2007

Voluntary Settlement Agreement

Staff presented a proposed consent agreement in the disciplinary hearing against Stokes County inspector Andrew Smith. A complaint was filed against Smith concerning building code defects concerning a single family dwelling. Mr. Smith has agreed to have his Standard Building level I Certificate suspended for a period of three calendar months, take a Building level I class, pass the Building level I state certification exam within one year and to surrender his Limited Inspection Certificates in Building, Plumbing, Mechanical and Electrical for Stokes County, Walnut Cove and King. The Board accepted the voluntary settlement agreement.

Voluntary Settlement Agreement

Staff presented a proposed voluntary settlement agreement in the disciplinary hearing against Ahoskie inspector Ernest G. Swanner. A complaint was filed against Swanner concerning inspections and procedures during his employment with Gates County. The Board rejected the voluntary settlement agreement and elected to have a hearing in the matter.

Continuing Education

Program Requirements

As a reminder for current and new inspectors, continuing education is required for all code enforcement officials holding active standard or limited certificates. As a condition of certificate renewal, six hours of continuing education must be completed for each active limited or standard certificate per renewal year (by June 30 each year) in each technical area. An individual

possessing both an active limited and standard certificate valid for the same area will only be required to complete six hours in that technical trade. Since we are starting the second year of our program, this is an important item to remember: **A code enforcement official can only receive credit for the same course once within a three-year period.**

A current list of course sponsors is available on our website at www.ncdoi.com.

Overview

The first year of the newly required continuing education program has been completed. There have been many obstacles to handle and adjustments to make during this first year. We, as a staff, are working to correct these problems that have been encountered by inspectors, instructors, and sponsors.

Currently, we are transitioning to an automated record keeping program which will allow the staff to update and track your completed continuing education courses as they are sent in by instructors. When attending continuing education courses, you will need to provide the instructor with your Standard or Limited Certificate number. The instructor will need to include this information on an Excel Transmittal Form that is provided by the staff and is being sent to each sponsor.

We have other adjustments that are in process and as they are complete, each department and provider will be informed. I want to thank each in-

pector, instructor, and sponsor, for his or her patience during this inaugural year. We hope to have a much smoother operation for renewal year 2007-2008.

Staff Changes

We have two new staff members to announce. Trisha Jogodka is the staff's Administrative Assistant. Trisha can assist you with questions regarding certification, exams, renewals, probationary and standard applications and fees. Leslie Allen is the staff's new Education Coordinator. Leslie can assist you with questions regarding standard courses, instructor training, and continuing education. Please feel free to contact any member of the staff by phone or e-mail at any time.

State Exam Testing and Standard Courses

The NC Code Officials Qualification Board began testing on the printed 2006 NC State codes in March, 2007 (we currently use the 2002 NC Residential Code). Standard courses include the printed 2006 NC State Codes as well. We will begin testing on the 2006 NC Residential Code in March, 2008.
